1. HELP, NOT HARM, CHILDREN WITH GENDER IDENTITY ISSUES

SB 480 by Sen. Tyler Johnson - (Help, Not Harm), is a huge win for common sense and human decency. This bill prohibits doctors from performing gender "transition" procedures on minors, or assisting another physician in doing so. This would include puberty blocking drugs, cross-sex hormones and surgery. The bill would also increase the statute of limitations for a minor to sue a medical provider who has harmed them through attempting to "transition" them, allowing minors to sue until the age of 28 in order to hold those who want to profit off of their pain accountable. 

PRIORITY BILL THAT DID NOT GET A HEARING: HB 1407 STRENGTHENING PARENTAL RIGHTS AND PROTECTING PARENTS FROM TRANS ACTIVIST BUREAUCRATS

Indiana Department of Child Services views Christian parents who will not socially transition their children as abusive. They have made it a practice of removing a child from an otherwise safe home merely because parents refuse to refer to their son as a daughter. IFI has been helping Mary and Jeremy Cox for the last 2 years because of this exact scenario. Parental rights are at risk in Indiana, yet HB 1407, which would have solved this problem, was passed by the Indiana House but was then sent to the Rules Committee in the Indiana Senate and was never given a hearing. The Rules Committee is often a place where bills are sent to die.
