1. SAVE WOMEN’S COLLEGE SPORTS

HB 1041 by Rep. Michelle Davis (R-58) protects young women at the col-
legiate level by ensuring men can’t enter into female sports teams in the
state of Indiana. This law is a continuation of the efforts that were started
during the 2022 session by Rep. Davis and IFI by building on the existing
law that says boys can’t compete in girls’ sports prior to age 18. These pro-
tections are now in place for girls and young women starting in elementa-
ry school and remains in place until they graduate from college.

2. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY IN EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAM

community, as it ensures that religious nonprofits fulfilling their ministry
of educating children in the early stages of their education aren’t penal-
ized and denied the opportunity on the ground of religious beliefs. By law,
these nonprofits now have the same opportunities to enter into agree-
ments with local school corporations as secular organizations.

ments to complete high school. This law ensures that the state, a local
agency or an institution of higher education in Indiana can’t reject or treat
a person differently based solely on the source of a diploma or credential.

4. ESTABLISHING PARENTAL RIGHTS AS A FUNDAMENTAL RIGHT

SB 143 by Sen. Liz Brown (R-15) establishes parental rights as a funda-
mental right in the state of Indiana, much like what exists within the US
Constitution. Parents have the primary role to play in the care and protec-
tion of their children. The government should not be the one standing in
the way of a parent and the well-being of their children. This legislation
allows for the parents to be in control of their children’s care while still
allowing for safeguards to be put in place for government intervention
when needed. Ultimately, the bill puts parents on equal footing with
the government by giving parents the rights within Indiana that are also
afforded to them by the US Constitution. In doing so, parents then have
remedy against the government within the state when their rights have
been violated, which puts parents on equal footing with the government
since governments within the state can use the state courts, while parents’
only remedy is through the federal courts.

5. TRANSPARENCY IN SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS

SB 287 by Sen. Gary Byrne (R-47) applies transparency and account-

for school board to either state on the ballot their party affiliation (Re-
publican, Democrat, or Independent), or leave the affiliation blank if the
candidate chooses to withhold that information from the voters. For too
long, school board members throughout Indiana have hid their ideolog-
ical beliefs from the voters. This bill is a great step in ensuring that there’s
greater transparency to the voters on who they’re electing while also
applying greater accountability to the school board member in serving in
their public service capacity.

6. PROHIBITION OF DEI IN EDUCATION

SB 289 by Sen. Gary Byrne (R-47) repeals the practice DEI within Indi-

teristics and individual merit. Specifically, this law prohibits public em-
ployer training requirements or licensure requirements that would affirm
the following ideas: a person is inherently superior or inferior to another
person due to different personal characteristic, a person should be blamed
for actions committed in the past, or a person’s moral character is deter-
mined by their personal characteristics. If the state doesn’t adhere to the
above outlined values, this law creates a pathway for a person to seek legal
remedy.

uality on the school’s website and to include a link to the list of materials
on electronically formatted written consent forms. This law also requires
the school board to approve any materials that will be used to instruct on
human sexuality, and that if instruction is to occur, it must include a pre-
sentation on human growth and development during pregnancy.
